Photographer Chris Sullivan was AWOL once again, recuperating from a "job related" injury.


John once again reminded Members that annual dues must be paid no later than the upcoming March meeting, which will also feature the 2025 Officer class elections.

Don Dressel led the Show and Tell parade with his long-awaited reveal of VASA's beakhead: this was the first build Don has come across where the prow is a separate construction that must be aligned and attached to the hull. Despite months of misgivings about such an arrangement Don reported that securing the aligned beakhead went well.

Niko McKinley showed off a pair of LEGO battleships that he recently built. The battleship pictured at the top is a standard LEGO build, but the lower one is a scratch build completely designed by Niko.



Trystan Lee delivered a lengthy report on the December 7, 1941 attack on Pearl Harbor to accompany his three scratch builds, depicting the battleships OKLAHOMA and ARIZONA, and a represtentation of today's ARIZONA Memorial that is moored above the ship.


Steve Scheet presented his completed build for the Community Build IV project. This is Steve's first serious attempt at a wood model having come from the remote-control side of modelling.

Congratulations to Steve on being the first to complete the Community Build project with such a beautifully crafted model.

His assertion that it would probably be the only one completed did raise a few eyebrows however, Newsletter Editor included. Unexpected challenge: accepted.

Jon noted that he fashioned the few missing pieces from wood and color-matched them to the existing ivory. Cleanup of the dirt from the ivory was accomplished using common Dawn cleaner sparingly. Isaac Wills noted that this is quite possibly a Japanese sampan rather than a Chinese junk: Jon

Isaac Wills wrapped up Show and Tell for the evening with two recent models, the first being a LEGO kit of Shackleton's ENDURANCE. Isaac noted that kit's scale was determined by the length of existing LEGO pieces that represent the life boats.

One question: where is all the ice?

In a different medium, Isaac constructed an MDF (medium-density fiberboard) kit of Robert Stephenson's ROCKET, a steam locomotive power by coal-derivative coke.

Squared Away – understanding nautical terms

The **HALF-BREADTH PLAN** is a bottom-view drawing of a vessel depicting the shape of the hull and waterlines. The half-breadth plan is a horizontally divided depiction of the hull: the lower portion shows the hull view, the top portion shows the deck view. From this plan one can derive the waterlines of the vessel. Companion to the BODY PLAN and SHEER PLAN.

TITANIC Build Log by Don Bienvenue

Log Entry: No. 7

In <u>Log Entry: No. 6</u> I discussed the detailing of the Lifeboats, Cranes, and Masts.

Coming to the End

This last Log Entry covers the final stages of construction of TITANIC. Work consisted of adding the photo-etched railings and rigging the masts. There were also a few other minor photo-etched items (the crow's nest on the foremast) and signage decals that were added.

Railings

A tip that I found helpful in attaching the many sections of photo-etched railing (especially for longer areas such as the bow and stern) was to tack each rail in place with Tamiya masking tape at intervals along the span of rail, and then begin attaching the rail by gluing one of the railing ends. I then removed the closest piece of tape and glued that rail area to the model. This continued as I worked my way to the other end of the railing. This was especially helpful at the stern because of the large curved area.

TITANIC Disaster II


Figure 2 — rigging disaster

Having *just* finished rigging the foremast, I proceeded to do a thorough job of demolishing all the rigging with my arm (Figure 2)! I was very lucky to have used a brass mast as noted in a previous Log Entry, otherwise a plastic mast would have

broken into pieces. I removed the rigging and started over, re-rigging everything all over again: lesson learned.

ALWAYS pay attention to where you are in relation to your model!

Marconi Aerial Cables

I tried a couple of methods for rigging the Marconi aerial cables. First, I tried using wire, but there were a couple of kinks in the wire that I could not remove. I then tried using thread. The thread initially had bends and twists and didn't look good. The cables should not be taut but have a slight sag to them. I remembered a trick I had seen to stiffen thread for rigging: pass each thread over Elmer's White Glue, giving a coating throughout the length of each of the four threads. This helped to stiffen the thread and made it easier to obtain a consistent sag the length of the span.

Finished!

After a couple of final touch-ups, TITANIC was completed: she took a total of 14 months to build. The following are some photos of the finished build...

Five Clear Liquids

Repurposed paint jars refilled when required in small amounts that don't take up much room on your workspace: this ensures they'll be close at hand when you need them without the hassle of going to the garage to deal with pints and quarts.



Isopropyl alcohol

Softens and/or removes white glue bonds on wood. Apply liberally where glue has set and reapply until glue gets gummy and parts can be pried apart. Mild odor. Evaporates quickly.

Acetone

Cleanly strips varnishes. Cleans brass, copper, and other metals prior to blackening or soldering. Strong odor. Evaporates very quickly.

Tap water

Thins water colors or acrylic paints before application. Cleans paint brush when using water colors or acrylic paints. Odorless. Evaporates slowly.

Distilled water

Mixes/activates Liver of Sulfur chips to blacken brass. Used to soften and free decals from backing, repair small wood blemishes. Odorless. Evaporates slowly. *Thinner*

Paint/varnish stripper, though less caustic (and less effective) than acetone for that purpose. Thins enamel paints and varnishes before application. Cleans paint brush when using enamel paint or varnish. Moderate odor. Evaporates moderately quickly.
